ABSTRACT

On the Post-Enlightenment Evolution of Moral Universalism*

Is humanity's circle of moral concern expanding, as often claimed? I explore frequencies of morally universal language in 15m book publications in American English, British English, French, Spanish, German, and Italian from 1800-2000. In each language, morally universal terminology diminished substantially. I then test two prominent hypotheses predicting moral universalism: reason and religion. Reason-based terminology correlates positively with morally universal and morally communal terminology, explaining seemingly contradictory observations of the 20th century. In contrast, communal terminology subsides when religious terminology becomes more frequent. These empirical patterns cast doubt on prominent claims of moral universalism expanding.

1 Introduction

Across scientific disciplines and a number of prominent popular commentators, a consensus has emerged suggesting humans have been expanding their moral concern towards including all humanity over the past centuries. For example, the philosopher Peter [Singer](#) (1981, 2011) prominently sketches an *Expanding Circle*, positing “[t]he circle of altruism has broadened from the family and tribe to the nation and race” (also see [Lecky](#), 1891). Slight variations of this concept include the *web of sympathy*, the *expanding circle of moral regard* ([Reed II and Aquino](#), 2003; [Laham](#), 2009), *moral expansiveness* ([Crimston et al.](#), 2016, 2018), the *expanding circle of sympathy* ([Pinker](#), 2018), the *moral arc* ([Shermer](#), 2015), and *the vast expansion of human concern* ([McCullough](#), 2020; also see [Bloom](#), 2010, [McFarland](#), 2011, [Pinker](#), 2011, and [Rosling](#), 2019). As [Crimston et al.](#) (2018) summarize, “[t]here seems little doubt that people’s moral boundaries have been expanding over time.”

However, this *Expanding Circle* hypothesis remains difficult to test empirically, with the associated arguments primarily being based on anecdotal evidence. As proof, proponents of-

ten cite historical developments with the abolition of slavery in numerous countries, diminishing rates of individual- and intergroup-level violence, decolonization, universal suffrage, civil rights movements, and international interventions in conflict and disaster emergencies (e.g., see [Pinker, 2011](#)). Nonetheless, these accounts are contrasted against 20th century atrocities associated with two World Wars, the Holocaust, the systematic repressive cruelties of various post-WWII dictatorships, and recent waves of nationalism accompanied by sharp delineations of in- versus outgroups in various countries. Thus, it remains an empirical question to ask whether societies' levels of moral universalism are indeed expanding.

An answer to this question proves highly relevant. For one, most policy challenges of the 21st century are of a global – rather than a local, national, or regional – nature: Prominent examples include climate change, contagious diseases, and transnational terrorism. These challenges all require international communication, cooperation, and coordination, as individual societies will not be able to overcome these and other obstacles that lay in the path of human progress.¹ Consequently, if societies' focus lies primarily on inwards, so-called *communal* moral values (e.g., nationalism, embodied by campaign slogans like *Make America Great Again*), rather than *universal* moral values, the likelihood of formulating successful solutions to these problems is likely to diminish.

Two branches of empirical studies directly relate to the topic of moral universalism. First, a body of experimental work focuses on *contemporaneous* drivers of altruism, compassion, and empathy (e.g., see [Nowak et al., 2000](#), [Fehr and Fischbacher, 2003](#), [Andreoni et al., 2017](#), or [Waytz et al., 2019](#)). Such research endeavors often focus on the behavior of individuals and small groups, at times exploring ingroup-outgroup relationships and situations under which intergroup disparities emerge and vanish. Second, insightful work in anthropology, evolutionary biology, neuroscience, and related disciplines seeks to explain our species' long-run develop-

ment of caring for others (e.g., see [Gintis et al., 2003](#), [Delgado et al., 2005](#), [Moll et al., 2005](#), [Bowles, 2006](#), [Nowak, 2006](#), and [Bašić et al., 2021](#); also see studies in primatology from [Prestona and de Waal, 2002](#) or [Brosnan and De Waal, 2003](#)). However, in between contemporaneous studies (that focus on the immediate present) and evolutionary approaches (that considers spans of hundreds of thousands of years), we lack empirical inquiries tracing moral universalism in recent history.

The following pages offer such a test. To do so, I draw on *Moral Foundations Theory* and its *Moral Foundations Dictionary* ([Haidt and Joseph, 2004](#); [Haidt, 2007](#); [Graham et al., 2013](#)) as a comprehensive, carefully-researched set of terminologies associated with both purely morally universal (*MU*) language and purely morally communal (*MC*) language.² *MU* represents the idea that ethical values apply to “all people regardless of race, color, nationality, religion, or culture” ([Richardson and Williams, 2009](#)), thereby capturing the human boundaries of [Singer’s \(1981; 2011\) Expanding Circle](#) hypothesis. *MC*, on the other hand, captures words and stems that are specific to a group of humans, e.g., citizens of a particular nation, adherents to a particular religion, or supporters of a specific sports club. As is common, subtracting the frequency of *MC* from the frequency of *MU* language then produces the net level of morally universal language in a body of text.

To understand how the usage of morally universal language has developed over time, I access the universe of books recorded by *Google Ngram* between the years 1800 and 2000 ([Michel et al., 2011](#)). I select this time period because the *Google Ngram* corpus has been suggested to be sufficiently sizeable and credible in terms of approaching completeness from 1800 onwards ([Michel et al., 2011](#); [Younes and Reips, 2019](#)), while its methodology changed from the year 2000 onwards ([Greenfield, 2013](#)). It is estimated that *Google Ngram* holds approximately 20% of all the books published in human history ([Juola, 2022](#)). Specifically, I focus on

those six languages for which *Google Ngram* features a non-trivial number of books, even in the early 1800s: American English (with 6,791,194 books from 1800 to 2000), British English (1,680,908 books), French (2,218,374 books), Spanish (1,159,229 books), German (2,350,936 books), and Italian (799,588 books).³ Originally published in the English language, I contracted native language experts and professional translators to provide translations of the English dictionaries into French, Spanish, German, and Italian.

An important assumption about this approach is that language employed in contemporary book publications is to a non-trivial extent reflective of contemporary actions, attitudes, beliefs, and culture. Recent research has produced a host of studies that indeed suggest that to be the case. For example, language has been shown to be predictive of societies' and individuals' (i) time preferences and savings behavior (Chen, 2013), (ii) creativity and societal order (Jackson et al., 2019), (iii) revolutions (Leetaru, 2011), (iv) ingroup-outgroup dynamics (Waldron, 2012), (v) cheating (Turmunkh et al., 2019), as well as (vi) voting, political attitudes, and policymaking (Graham et al., 2009; Waytz et al., 2019; Enke, 2020; Kivikangas et al., 2021). Thus, I posit that studying *Google Ngram*'s collective body of writings allows for the derivation of a consistent and comparable barometer of moral universalism at different points in time for these six languages. If the circle of moral concern was indeed expanding, I hypothesize that we should be able to track that development in language, i.e., we should observe increased usage of morally universal terminology in the *Google Ngram* corpus for a given language over time.

However, the empirical patterns I observe are not consistent with that hypothesis. In fact, I find a significant *decline* in the frequency of morally universal language in all six languages since the early 1800s. Comparing the first decade of the 19th century to the last decade of the 20th century, I observe large drops by 2-3 standard deviations.

To better understand the underlying developments, I disaggregate morally universal language to study purely morally universal and purely morally communal language separately. The data show purely morally universalist language has indeed become less frequent in all six languages, while purely moral communalist language has become more frequent in American English, British English, French, and Spanish. While one needs to be careful not to over-interpret these patterns, they are informative as potentially powerful measures of morality over time.

Finally, I turn to the question of *why* these developments may have taken place. To do so, I turn to two prominent hypothesized drivers of moral universalism that are often advocated by various scholars, such as [Pinker \(2018\)](#): *reason* and *religiosity*. To derive a proxy for contemporary degrees of reason, defined as “the power of the mind to think, understand, and form *judgements logically* [emphasis in original]” ([Oxford Languages, 2023](#)), I access the *causation* dictionary of the *Linguistic Inquiry and Word Count (LIWC)* program that contains 135 words and stems in the English language, such as *because* or *effect*.⁴ To derive an annual measure of religiosity, I access the *LIWC* category on *religion* that contains 174 words and stems. As with all dictionaries, I rely on the same translators to derive versions in French, Spanish, German, and Italian.

While sharply identifying causal relationships remains difficult, correlations can be informative to get a glimpse of what might have happened. To filter out unobservable confounders as well as possible, I consider first differences of each variable, while accounting for language- and year-fixed effects. The corresponding results, again predicting aggregate *MU* frequencies, as well as their sub-components of pure *MU* and *MC*, suggest insightful patterns. An increase in the frequency of causal language correlates positively with both purely morally universal and purely morally communal language. In aggregate, however, morally universal language

decreases significantly as causal language increases ($p = 0.005$).

These results do not necessarily contradict [Pinker's \(2018\)](#), [Singer's \(2011\)](#), and others' propositions of an *Expanding Circle*; however, they do suggest reason may not only be accompanied by more concern for all humanity – but also by increased communalism. These observations are consistent with the seemingly contradicting events over the past 200 years, in which we have seen substantial progress in morally universal thinking and action (e.g., ending slavery in many countries, decolonization, universal suffrage, etc.) but also some of the most haunting human experiences and actions (e.g., the Holocaust, two World Wars, numerous genocides, etc.). In short, both concepts of morally universal and morally communal behavior appear to have expanded as humanity's level of reason has been rising.

In contrast, the share of religious language shows a clearer relationship with morally universal language. When religious terminology becomes more frequent, the share of purely moral communalist language subsides, while we observe no statistically or quantitatively relevant relationship with purely moral universal language. In aggregate, this means when religious language rises, so does morally universal language.

The paper proceeds with laying out the data employed, as well as the empirical strategy. Section 3 presents the main results, while Section 4 is dedicated to the connection between moral universalism and two of its most prominent suggested drivers. Section 5 concludes.

2 Data and Empirical Specification

2.1 Data

2.2 Moral Foundations Theory and the Moral Foundations Dictionary

Rooted in cultural and social psychology, Moral Foundations Theory provides an overarching framework to understand morality and its key linguistic components ([Graham et al., 2013](#)). The

two main categories constitute (i) morally universal language, capturing values that “apply irrespective of the context or identity of the people involved”, and (ii) morally communal language, identifying values that “are tied to certain relationships or groups” (Enke, 2020). Designed in English, the universalism category of the Moral Foundations Dictionary and the underlying *LIWC* is based on a large and representative sample of language used between the years 1660 and 2008 (Pennebaker et al., 2015, p.9). With over 57 million words studied, the *LIWC* program is able to capture over 86% of all words people have used in writing and speech (Tausczik and Pennebaker, 2010; Pennebaker et al., 2015, p.10).

Consistent with the underlying literature, I study the relative frequencies of morally universal versus morally communal language in language l and year t , measured as

$$MU_{l,t} = (\% \text{ universal terminology})_{l,t} - (\% \text{ communal terminology})_{l,t}. \quad (1)$$

The moral universalism dictionary (the first component of the right-hand-side) consists of the subcategories *Care/Harm* (51 words and stems) and *Fairness/Reciprocity* (45 words and stems) that are each subdivided into *Virtue*- and *Vice*-related terminology (see Appendix 5 for the full list of words and stems). The moral communalism dictionary (the second component on the right-hand-side) includes the subcategories *In-group/Loyalty* (52 words and stems) and *Authority/Respect* (82 words and stems) that are also characterized by *Virtue*- and *Vice*-related terminology (see Appendix 5). To better understand underlying dynamics, I then also study the individual components of the right-hand-side in equation (1).

2.2.1 Google Ngram

Google Ngram features an online interface on which anybody can explore the frequency with which a particular word or stem has been used in book publications in a specific language and year. The underlying project has been well explained in Michel et al. (2011), and a number of

scientific inquiries have now made use of *Google Ngram* to study contemporary phenomena, as reflected in the terminology used in book publications. Prominent example topics studied with *Google Ngram* include economic theories (Shiller, 2017), the evolution of sociolinguistic conventions (Naidu et al., 2017), the prominence and influence of Karl Marx (Magness and Makovi, 2023), and the rise of working mothers (Bastian, 2020).

I draw on native-language experts who work as professional translators in the particular language (e.g., English-to-Italian) or hold a translation degree in the respective language pair to derive dictionary versions for those languages in which *Google Ngram* features substantial coverage since 1800. Overall, this means I am able to study six languages: American English, British English, French, Spanish, German, and Italian. Table A3 documents book coverage for the 1800-1819 and 1900-1919 time periods as example snapshots, as well as the number of books in each language for the entire 1800-2000 period, ranging from 235,453 (Italian) to 2,319,634 (American English). I do not consider Chinese, Hebrew, and Russian books because of data availability in earlier time periods (see [Google Ngram Viewer Exports](#)).

The resulting number of words and stems varies by language, as some English words carry several synonyms in another language (e.g., *compassion* → *Barmherzigkeit*, *Erbarmen*, *Mitgefühl*, and *Mitleid* in German), while some English words translate to the same word (e.g., *to protect/to shield* → *(be)schützen*, among others). Appendix Sections B-F list all words and stems for each language.

Using the *R* package *ngram*, I download the annual frequencies of all words and stems of the moral universalism dictionaries from *Google Ngram* (3rd edition, 2019). *Google Ngram* does not allow case-insensitive searches of stems, so I download spellings with lower- and upper-case first letters separately. I then calculate the sum of these percentages for each language at the yearly level, generating the corresponding share of purely morally universal terminology and purely morally communal terminology. While earlier time periods have been suggested to suffer from selection issues (Pechenick et al., 2015; Younes and Reips, 2019), *Google Ngram* is

commonly perceived to be substantially more accurate and comprehensive from 1800 onwards (Greenfield, 2013; Jackson et al., 2019). For comparability and consistency reasons, the analysis stops in 2000 when *Google Ngram*'s methodology changed (Greenfield, 2013).

The average annual share of purely morally universal terminology (i.e., ignoring the *MC* component of equation 1) between 1800 and 2000 varies by language, ranging from 0.31% (British English) to 1.53% (Spanish). For reference points in the English language, the Old Testament, the New Testament, the US American *Bill of Rights*, and the *UN 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development* feature morally universal language in 0.25%, 0.26%, 0.68%, and 0.89% of their words, respectively. Tables A1 and A2 detail summary statistics and list the ten most frequent words and stems of each language. Some of the most common terms include references to *rights* (*droit/s; derecho; recht*) and *justice* (*justice; justicia; gerecht*).

To explore whether the *Expanding Circle* hypothesis is reflected in language, I simply plot each language's *MU* over the 201-year period of 1800-2000. If the circle was indeed expanding, and if language gave us a useful proxy for morality, then we should see an upwards trend over time.

3 Moral Universalism Over Time

3.1 Main Results

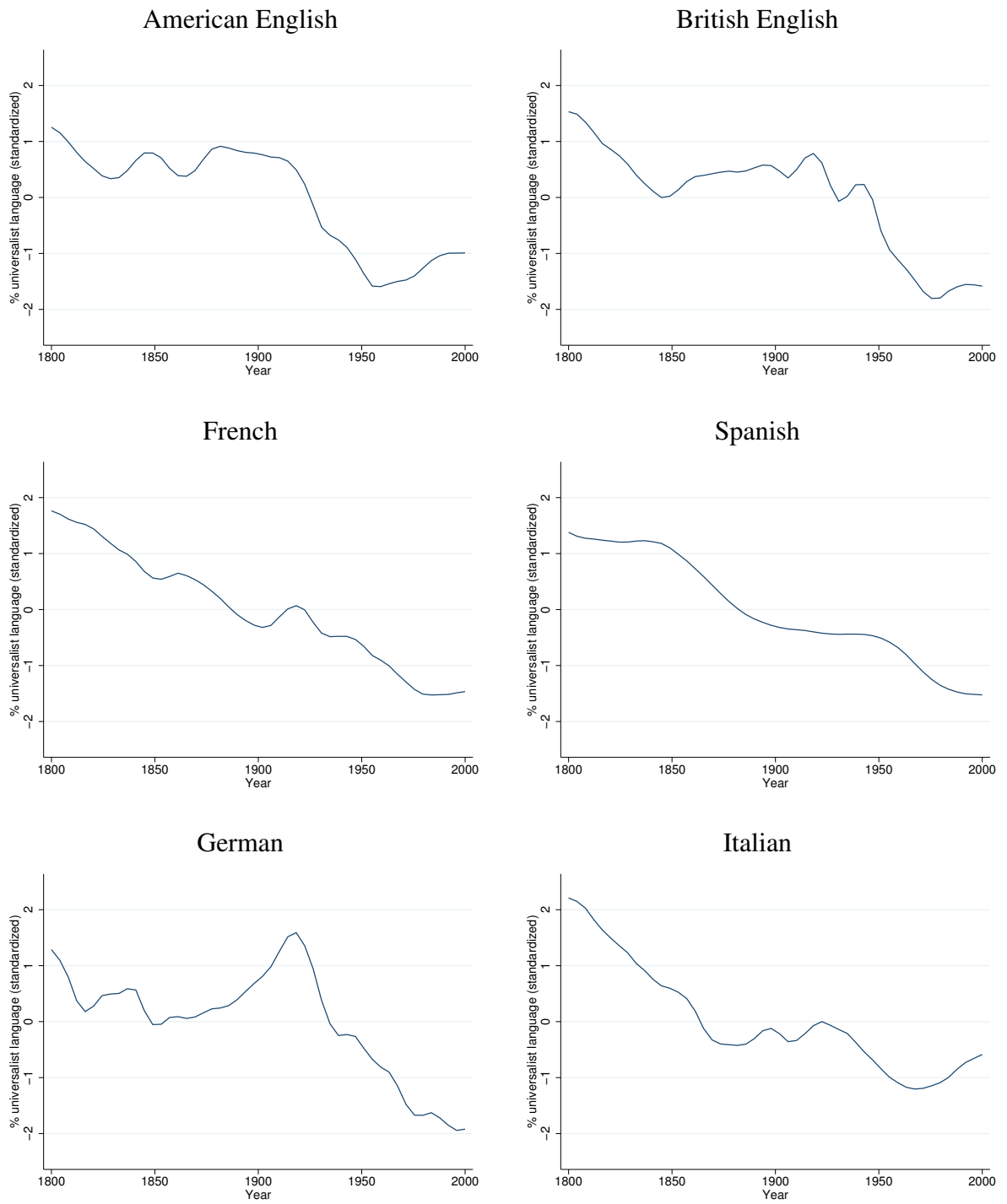


Figure 1: Morally universal language over time, subtracting the frequency of purely morally communal terminology from the frequency of purely morally universal terminology (see equation 1).

Figure 1 plots smoothed timelines of morally universal words and stems from 1800 to 2000, after standardizing the variable for each language for ease of comparison.⁵ The main big-picture insight, which emerges for all six languages, finds morally universal language to be less frequent recently, relative to the early 19th century when the Age of Enlightenment came to an end. This stands at odds with the *Expanding Circle* hypothesis, at least when it comes to

language usage over these two centuries. Finally, a recent upward trend starting in the second half of the 20th century (at least in American English, British English, French, and Italian) may explain why contemporary commentators generally feel positive about the Circle expanding: In their lifetime, morally universal language has indeed grown in frequency.

3.2 Robustness Checks: Moral Universalism Dictionary

First, I consider the moral universalism dictionary itself. Of course, some words or stems may not always be representative of morally universal concepts, particularly when it comes to different writing styles and eras. To explore the influence of the most prominent dictionary entries, I re-derive Figure 1 but exclude the three most frequent words or stems. The corresponding results, referred to Figure A1, again produce firmly negative long-term trends for all six languages. These conclusions firmly hold when excluding more of the top words and stems (results available upon request).

3.3 Robustness Checks: *Google Ngram*

Second, studying books captured by *Google Ngram* may produce bias for a couple of reasons. For one, the corpus does not capture *all* books. Omissions may become larger the further back in time we go; and if particular types of books were missing early on, that could induce a bias. For example, older books that survived may feature more morally universal language than their contemporary counterparts that were lost. If that were the case, Figure 1 may overstate the degree of morally universal language in the early years.

While it remains impossible to fully alleviate this concern, I take several avenues to that effect. In the first alternative, I access the *Google Ngram One Million* dictionary that randomly captures no more than 6,000 books per year to accommodate for the more sparse list of books included in earlier years. The resulting graph again produces a firm negative long-term trend in

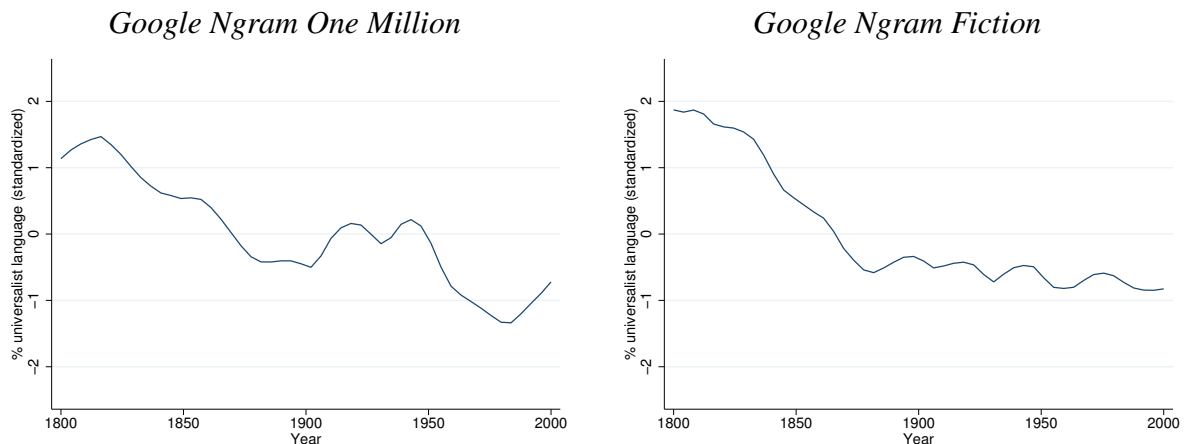


Figure 2: Universalism over time when studying the *One Million* and *Fiction* categories of *Google Ngram*, plotting kernel-weighted local polynomial smoothing graphs.

morally universal language (see Figure 2).

3.4 Google Ngram: One Million & Fiction

For the second alternative, I consider *Google Ngram Fiction*, i.e., books that were identified as fiction by a library or publisher (Google, 2021). This separate set of books holds constant the *type* of writing, which makes it less likely that selection issues early on can fundamentally influence results.⁶ *Google Ngram Fiction* also excludes scientific articles that have become particularly more frequent in the 20th century and may feature different language altogether (Pechenick et al., 2015; Younes and Reips, 2019). The corresponding graph again yields a firm negative long-term trend in morally universal language (see Figure 2).

3.5 Pure Moral Universalism and Pure Moral Communalism

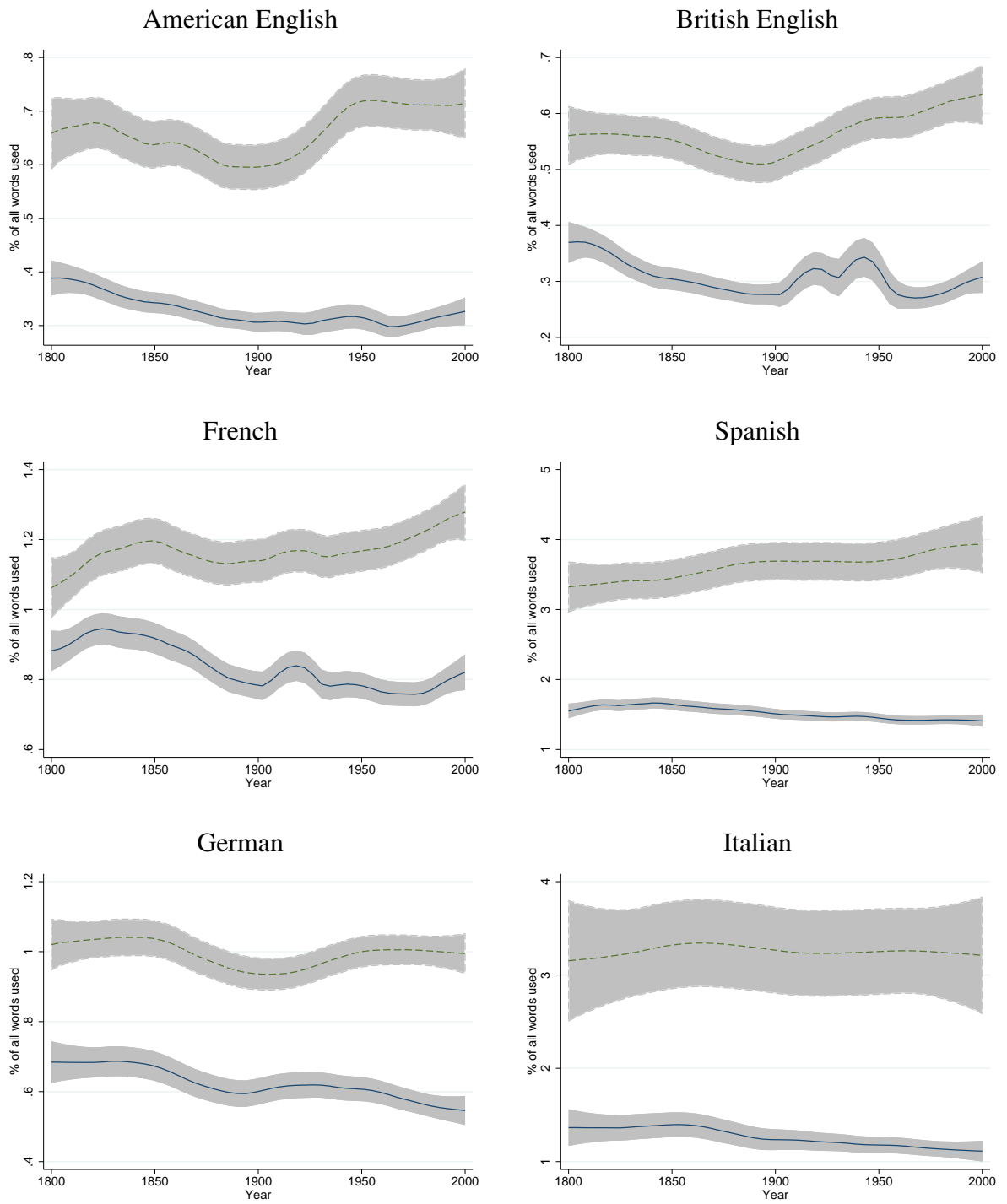


Figure 3: Universalist language (bold line) and communalist language (dashed line) over time, along with 95% confidence bands. *Note:* Scales on the y-axis differ across graphs to best illustrate language-specific trends.

Figure 3 breaks down the net *MU* dictionary into its components of purely morally universal and purely morally communal terminology. The respective timelines include 95% confidence bands that come from tracking the frequencies of every single word and stem over time. The

y-axis indicates the total share of words of all book publications that fall into the respective *MU* and *MC* dictionaries.

Figure 3 shows us that morally communal language (the dashed line) has visibly been on the rise for all languages except German and Italian, where *MC* trends are largely flat. In American English, for example, 0.65% of all words in books written between 1800 and 1809 were marked as morally communal. In 1991 to 2000, however, that share has increased to 0.72%, i.e., an increase by almost 11%. Put differently, every 154th word was morally communal at the beginning of the 19th century; and every 139th word at the end of the 20th century. These jumps are even larger in British English (a 16% increase), French (20%), and Spanish (23%).

Turning to purely morally universal language in Figure 3 (the bold lines), we observe decisive drops in all six languages. Again comparing the first to the final decade of the sample, American English, for instance, has seen a drop from 0.39% to 0.33%. This amounts to a decline of 15%. As an outside reference point, the difference in the share of purely morally universal language between the inauguration speeches of Donald Trump (2017) and Barack Obama (2013) amounts to 19% (1.03% versus 1.27%).

4 Prominent Suggested Drivers: Reason and Religiosity

Two prominent concepts often proposed – and at times pitted against each other – to spearhead human development along moral dimensions constitute (i) humans’ ability to *reason* and (ii) *religion*.

4.1 Reason

Concerning reason, Pinker’s (2018) quote at the beginning of this paper illustrates the idea: “...as reason goads us into realizing that there can be nothing uniquely deserving about ourselves or any of the groups to which we belong.” In a similar vein, Singer (1981, 2011, 2016) argues

that humans' capacity to reason generates the *Expanding Circle* (also see [Shermer, 2015](#) and [McCullough, 2020](#)). [Singer \(2016\)](#) argues:

“So the shift from a point of view that is disinterested between individuals within a group, but not between groups, to a point of view that is fully universal, is a tremendous change – so tremendous, in fact, that it is only just beginning to be accepted on the level of ethical reasoning and is still a long way from acceptance on the level of practice. Nevertheless, it is the direction in which moral thought has been going since ancient times. Is it an accident of history that this should be so, or is it the direction in which our capacity to reason leads us?”

Thus, is ‘our capacity to reason’ predictive of moral universalism? The [Encyclopedia Britannica](#) defines reason as “the faculty or process of drawing logical inferences”. To derive a language-year-level measure of reason, I access the *LIWC*'s *causation* category (135 words and stems) that includes words such as *because* or *effect*, as well as stems such as *deduce** or *imply**. Relying on the same language experts, I obtain translations and then access *Google Ngram* to obtain the corresponding frequencies in each language over time. Sections [5](#), [A0.0.1](#), [A0.0.1](#), [A0.0.1](#), and [A1](#) list the full dictionaries.

4.2 Religion

The other predominant force in seeking to explain *MU* concerns religion (e.g., see [Bloom, 2012](#) or [Hofmann et al., 2014](#)). As [Enke \(2023\)](#) summarizes, “[s]everal literatures have argued that moralizing religions give rise to higher prosociality, trust and universalist values”, referring to [Norenzayan \(2013\)](#) and [Norenzayan et al. \(2016\)](#). Nevertheless, [Enke et al. \(2023\)](#) report a negative correlation between survey-elicited religiosity levels and moral universalism across five Western countries with Australia, France, Germany, Sweden, and the US (also see [Cappelen et al., 2022](#)).

To derive an annual measure of religiosity, I access the *LIWC* category on *religion* (174 words and stems). Example words include *afterlife*, *holy*, and *allah*, as well as the stems *gospel**, *preach**, and *worship**. As with the other dictionaries, I rely on the same translators to derive French, Spanish, German, and Italian versions. Sections 5, A0.0.1, A0.0.1, A0.0.1, and A1 document the full lists of words and stems.

4.3 Causal and Religious Terminology Usage Over Time

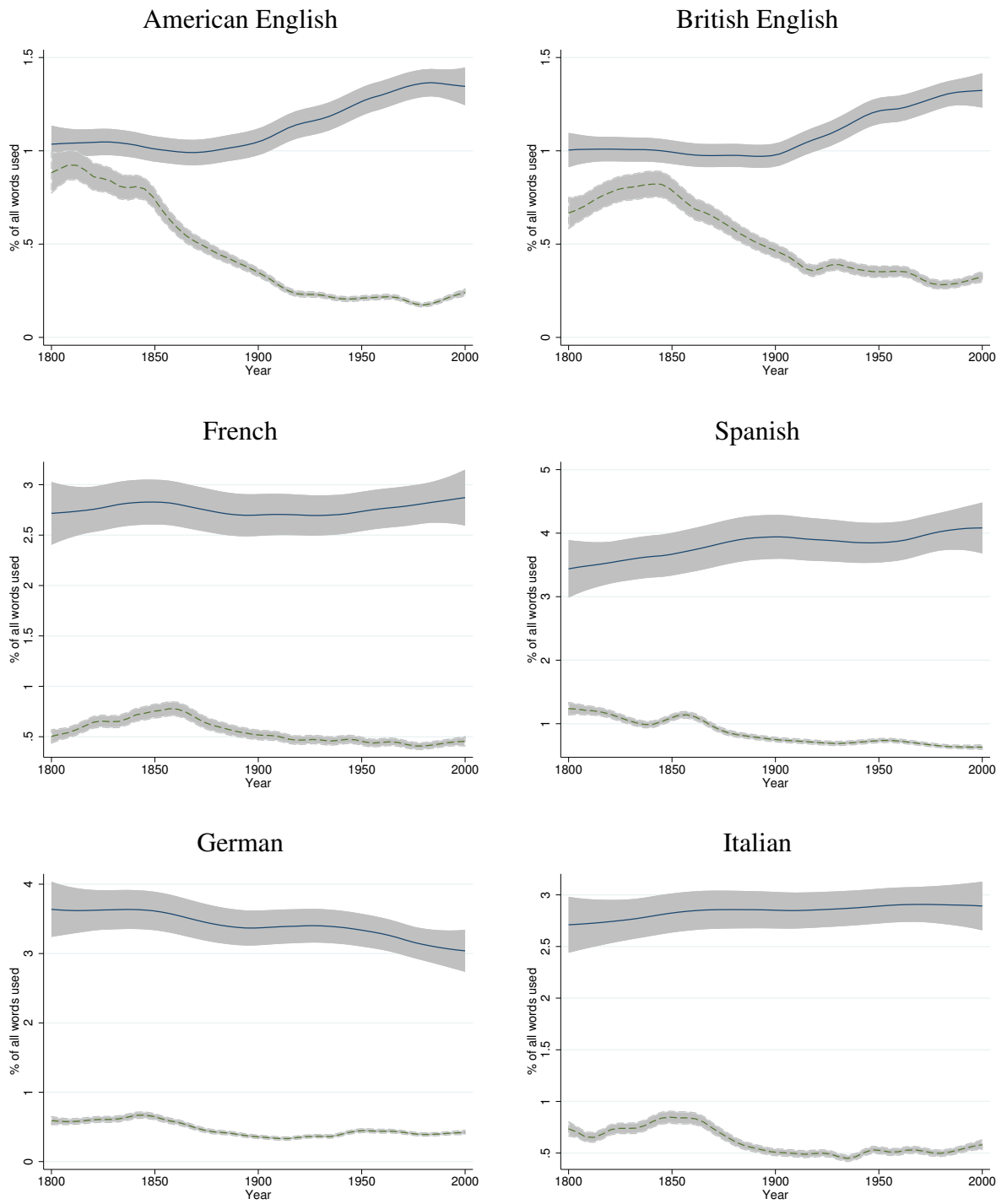


Figure 4: Causal language (bold line) and religious language (dashed line) over time, along with 95% confidence bands. *Note:* Scales on the y-axis differ across graphs to best illustrate language-specific trends.

Figure 4 visualizes time trends of both causal and religious terminology usage for all six languages. In all languages but German, we observe a firm rise in the frequency of causal language being employed in book publications. At the same time, religious language is generally employed less so towards the end of the 20th century than 200 years ago. In American English, for example, writings in the early 1800s included causal and religious language with almost the same frequency of roughly every 100th word falling in each of the corresponding dictionaries. In the final decade of the 1900s, however, one in 75 written words appears in the causality dictionary, while only one in 435 words appears in the religion dictionary.

4.4 Correlates of Moral Universalism

Finally, I turn to the question of whether and how the frequencies of causal and religious language correlate with how often morally universal language is employed within a language over time. To filter out global time trends and the potential influence of unobservable confounders as much as possible, I employ first-differences to the relevant variables.⁷ Specifically, I estimate the following regression for language l and year t :

$$\Delta MU_{l,t} = \beta \Delta Cause_{l,t} + \gamma \Delta Religion_{l,t} + \lambda_l + \theta_t + \epsilon_{l,t}, \quad (2)$$

where λ_l and θ_t constitute language- and year-fixed effects, thereby removing any language- and year-specific variation that could otherwise affect the derivation of β and γ . For example, language-fixed effects address concerns about particular words of these dictionaries holding various meanings, some of which may not necessarily fall under the definition of the respective dictionary. Year-fixed effects account for overall global developments, such as those related to technological progress, economic and other societal characteristics, or the World Wars. In all specifications, standard errors are clustered at the language level. If the prominent hypothesis of reason being a fundamental catalyst of *MU* was of substance, we would expect a positive, statistically significant, and quantitatively meaningful coefficient β .

Columns (1)-(3) of Table 1 document the corresponding results. I first include each regressor separately before estimating the full model outlined in equation (2) in column (3). Surprisingly, causal language emerges as a firm negative predictor of net morally universal language (i.e., the difference between pure *MU* language and pure *MC* language). In terms of magnitude, a 10% rise in causal language is associated with a 5.6-5.8% decline in morally universal terminology ($p = 0.005$ and $p = 0.004$ in columns 1 and 3, respectively). These correlations are not consistent with the prominent hypothesis of reason driving the expansion of moral universalism, at least to the extent that contemporary language can proxy these developments.

Religious language, on the other hand, correlates positively with morally universal language.⁸ While the implied magnitude remains more modest, with a 10% increase in religious terminology being accompanied by a 0.3-0.4% rise in morally universal language, the relationship still remains precisely estimated in statistical terms ($p = 0.003$ in both columns). In other words, as religious language vanished from book publications, as seen in Figure 4, so did

⁸Importantly, there are no word or stem overlaps between the universalism and religiosity dictionaries except for one word in Spanish (*apiadarse*), which I remove from the religiosity dictionary. The same is true for the other dictionaries, i.e., there are no words or stem listed in more than one dictionary – the only exception are four words in French and two words in Spanish that are removed from the analysis reported in Table 1. For French, these are *explicable*, *justifiable*, *raisonnable*, and *raisonnablement*. For Spanish, these are *afectante* and *razonablemente*. Including these in either of the respective dictionaries leaves the results from Table 1 virtually unchanged (results available upon request).

morally universal language.

4.5 Correlates of Pure Moral Universalism and Pure Moral Communalism

Finally, columns (4)-(6) and (7)-(9) break up the overall *MU* index and predict frequencies of purely morally universal, as well as purely morally communal terminology. Since the overall *MU* index consists of both components, it is important to understand where the overall correlations are coming from. For example, is the link between causal and morally universal language driven by the moral or the communal sub-category?

Columns (4) and (7) provide an answer to this question: Indeed, a rise in the frequency of causal language correlates *both* with more morally universal *and* more morally communal language. However, in aggregate, the latter relationship is more powerful, as illustrated by the results reported in column (1). Thus, the popular association between reason and *MU* is not wrong – it just only covers half of the underlying relationship. Reason also seems to be associated with a strong emergence of *MC*. These results remain consistent once we also account for religious terminology in columns (6) and (9).

When it comes to religious terminology, we also find insightful patterns. By itself, morally universal language does not become more frequent with an increased usage of religious terminology, as illustrated by the results of columns (5) and (6). However, a rise in religious language is predictive of a decrease in morally communal language.

5 Conclusion

This paper aims to make three contributions. First, I provide a consistent, comparable barometer of moral universalism, as well as its sub-components of pure moral universalism and pure

moral communalism, from the years 1800 to 2000. To do so, I apply the *Moral Foundations Dictionary* to *Google Ngram* in the six Western languages for which *Google Ngram* holds substantial numbers of book publications, even in the early 1800s. The empirical patterns suggest, unanimously, that morally universal terminology has decreased decisively in frequency since the Age of Enlightenment came to an end in the early 19th century. Interpreting language as a mirror of contemporary attitudes, beliefs, culture, and values, these results seemingly stand at odds with various versions of Peter Singer's (1981, 2011) *Expanding Circle* hypothesis of moral concern.

Second, to better understand underlying developments, I disaggregate moral universalism into (i) purely morally universal terminology (i.e., values applying to any human, independent of their ethnicity, race, or other characteristics) and (ii) purely morally communal terminology (i.e., values connected to individual- or group-level characteristics, such as nation, race, or gender). Indeed, purely universal terminology became less frequent in all six languages, while morally communal language rose up across four languages. Again, these results are not consistent with the hypothesis of an *Expanding Circle*, at least between 1800 and 2000.

Third and final, I explore two prominent hypotheses often connected to the *Expanding Circle*: (i) humans' ability to reason and (ii) religion. Applying comprehensive dictionaries on each concept to *Google Ngram*, I then correlate the respective frequencies with that of morally universal language. What I find is one possible explanation that is able to reconcile observations of a seemingly *Expanding Circle* with the patterns observed in language: Reason-based terminology indeed goes hand-in-hand with purely morally universal language – however, it is *also* positively associated with a strong uptick in morally communal terminology. Thus, reason may come with a divergence of morality, pushing *both* morally universal and morally communal ideas.

Finally, a recent upward trend starting in the second half of the 20th century (at least in American English, British English, French, and Italian) may explain why contemporary com-

mentators generally feel positive about the Circle expanding: In their lifetime, morally universal language has indeed grown in frequency.

Of course, these empirical patterns should not be interpreted from a strictly causal perspective; these are correlations that *may* be indicative of broad societal patterns, but I cannot exclude the possibility of endogeneity influencing the derived estimates. Nevertheless, I hope this provides an empirical starting point for researchers to test broad claims of moral developments at the societal level over relatively long time periods.

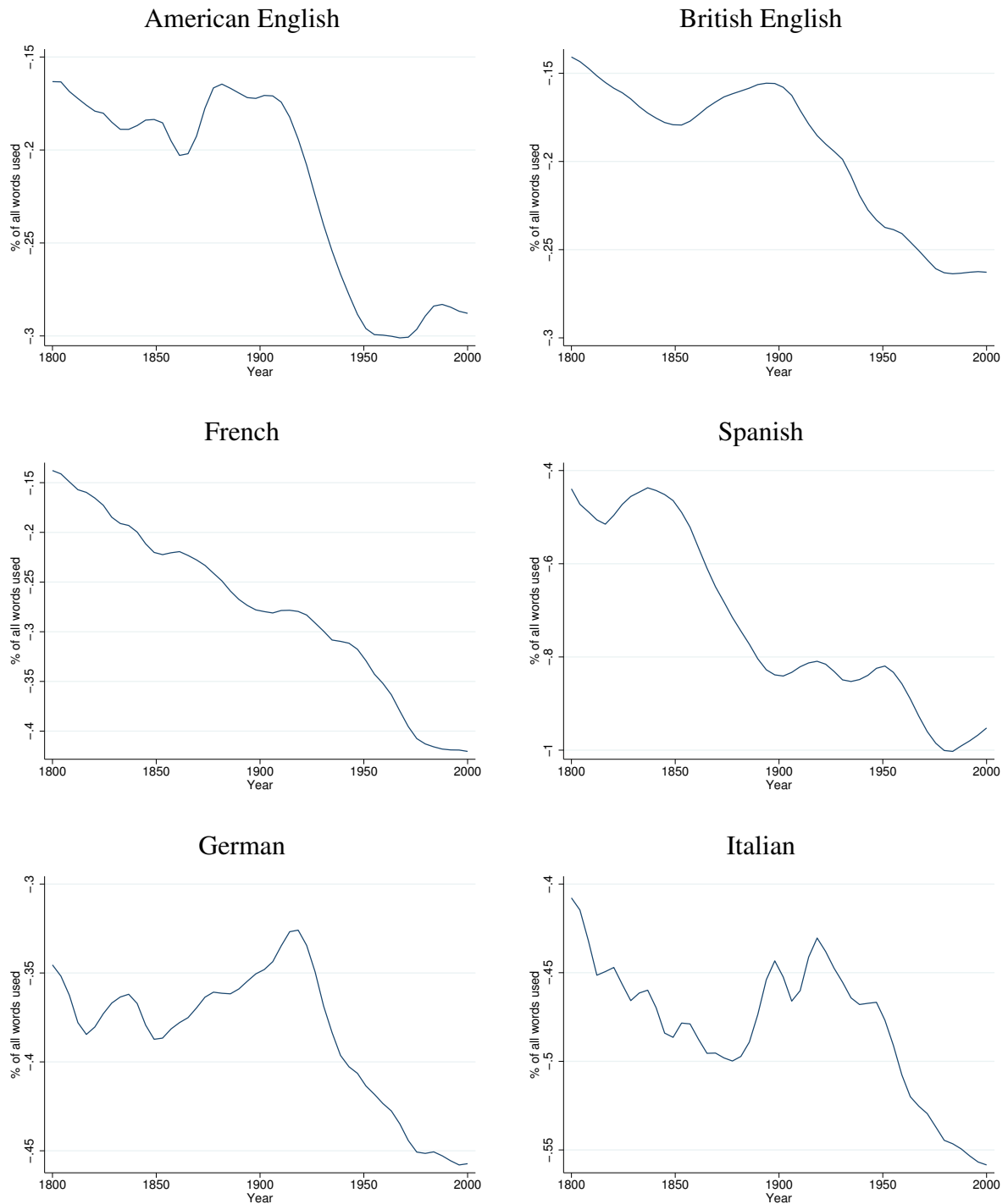


Figure A1: Universalism over time (excluding the top 3 words/stems for each language), plotting a kernel-weighted local polynomial smoothing graph.
